




2016 ELECTION RESULTS BY STATE




2012 Presidential Election Electoral Vote Results




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










Counties where Trump increased the Republican vote (MAINLY RURAL)

TOTAL U.S. EMPLOYMENT AT ALL-TIME HIGH


US EMPLOYED PERSONS










Texas Delinquency Rates Falling Except for Auto Loans






Since 2000, Texas is second only to Florida in attracting transplants from other states.

Net domestic migration 2000 to 2015, in thousands




While Texas attracts many people from abroad, domestic migration is larger and faster growing.


Net migration to Texas

OTHER POLITICAL FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO THE TRUMP VICTORY

- Lower voter turnout (48%) than in 2012 and lowest since 1996
- Black voter turnout lower than in 2012
- 30 percent of Latinos voted for Trump
- 25 percent jump in premiums for Obamacare (health insurance for low and middle income households) announced two weeks before election

VOTER DISCONTENT AND OTHER EXPLANATIONS FROM THE PUNDITS

Revolt against the "establishment"

- Washington elites who tend to be liberal
- The media
- Banks, Wall St., and big business
- Distrust of government
- Clinton "fatigue" and unlikeability

OTHER FACTORS IN THE ELECTION

- -Estrangement of working-class voters, especially whites in rural areas
- -Median earnings for white males lower than in the 1970s (adjusted for inflation)
- -The urban/rural split
- -The "coasts" v. the "heartland"
- -Terrorism and xenophobia

DID TRUMP WIN THE ELECTION OR DID CLINTON LOSE IT?

- Trump capitalized on economic insecurity and the myth that illegal immigrants were "stealing" jobs from American nationals
- Trump further appealed to displaced and underemployment workers by claiming that their jobs were being lost to imports—though empirical evidence suggests otherwise
- Clinton ignored the less-educated white electorate, especially in rural areas, while trying to build larger majorities among urban Latino and black voters
- The resurfacing of Clinton's "e-mail" investigation by the FBI a week before the election may have swung some votes to Trump
